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The Gold Rush

Gold was discovered in California at John Sutter's sawmill on the 11 American River in January of 1848. 17 Sutter was a real adventurer. A native of Switzerland, he had come to 30 New York City in 1834. From there, he traveled to St. Louis, Santa Fe, the 45 Oregon Territory, Hawaii, and Alaska before finally settling in California 55 in 1839. 57 The Mexican government gave Sutter almost 50,000 acres of land in the 69 Sacramento Valley. Farming and trade made him rich. He built Fort Sutter 81 near the Sacramento River. The fort had a flourmill and bakery, a blacksmith 94 shop, rooms for Sutter's workers and guests, a general store, and a saloon. 107 Sutter's sawmill was about 45 miles east of the fort. James Marshall 119 was Sutter's partner in the mill. Marshall was at work one day when, to his 134 amazement, he noticed a yellow metal shining in some water. 144 Was it gold? Marshall wasn't sure, so he rode back to the fort to show 159 Sutter. Together, they performed a few tests that seemed to confirm that the 172 metal was gold. 175 Sutter wanted to keep the discovery a secret. He feared that if word got 189 out, the mill and his surrounding property would be overrun with people 201 searching for gold. 204 Sutter's fears were well-founded. It was impossible to keep news of the 216 discovery a secret. Soon the workers at Sutter's mill were looking for gold 229 after work. Then the news spread to San Francisco. A newspaper owner went 242 to Sutter's mill to check out the story. When he returned, he ran through 256 the streets with a bottle filled with gold dust. "Gold! Gold! Gold from the 270 American River!" he cried. 274 The great California Gold Rush was on! Over the next six years, 300,000 287

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people came west hoping to strike it rich.

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
