Prepositional Phrases

A **prepositional phrase** adds information to a sentence. It can tell *where, when,* or *how,* or it can add detail. It begins with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun. The noun or pronoun is the object of the preposition.

prepositional phrase

Holly is the feature editor for our local newspaper. **Where** She became editor in 2011. **When** She writes her stories on the computer. **How** She often writes stories about dogs and cats. **Detail**
